This *Mobility Funding Guide* is a concrete output of the mapping of funding opportunities for international exchange in 19 countries in Asia. It was first released on culture360.org in September 2012 by the Asia-Europe Foundation (ASEF) with the cooperation of Arts Network Asia (ANA), Korea Arts Management Service (KAMS), *Japan Center, Pacific Basin Arts Communication (PARC), and Tokyo Performing Arts Market (TPAM).*

Its main objectives are to make available online the existing information on funding that supports the international mobility of artists and cultural operators in Asia, and to provide input to funders on how to fill in the existing funding gaps for international cultural exchange in Asia.

The guide follows the existing model of the *Guide* to *funding* opportunities for the international mobility of artists and culture professionals in Europeⁱ, produced by the Foundation Interarts, On the Move and PRACTICS.

In this Asian edition, you can find funding opportunities by country in most artistic and cultural disciplines. The guide lists national resources when available, as well as regional and international sources of funding - be they public or private. Only regular opportunities accessible online are listed. Not included are: funds for which information is only available offline, funds that are not based on open calls, and ad hoc or short-term funding.

For a full overview of the methodology and scope of the research, please refer to the publication's *General Introduction*ⁱⁱ.

This guide is an attempt to gather all the resources in one document, and is by no means complete. As we aim to update it on a regular basis through further research and input from the field, your feedback is crucial.

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<u>1. ORGANISATIONS WITH A PARTICULAR FOCUS ON ASIA AND/OR SOUTH-EAST</u> ASIA

1.1 Asian Cultural Council

Description: The Asian Cultural Council (ACC) supports cultural exchange in the fields of visual and performing arts between Asia, the United States and amongst Asian countries. Applications are accepted from individuals and institutions.

The main focus of the ACC grant programme is awarding grants to artists, scholars and arts specialists from Asia for study, research, observation and related activities in the United States of America or in another Asian country.

The ACC considers applications from Asian students pursuing graduate study in universities in the United States. Applications are not accepted for undergraduate programmes and the grant extends only to living expenses and international airfare. Applicants are encouraged to find other sources of funding for their tuition. Students must apply separately to universities for acceptance while applying to the ACC for funds.

Type of mobility: Residencies; scholarships/postgraduate training courses; "go and see" or short-term exploration grants; support for the participation of professionals in transnational networks; "research" grants for scholarships

Sectors: Theatre, dance, music, painting, sculpture, photography, design, arts criticism, arts theory, installation, applied arts, video/new media, architecture, cultural heritage, research, cultural management

Eligibility criteria

Nationality: Bangladesh, Brunei, Cambodia, China, India, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, Laos, Malaysia, Mongolia, Myanmar, Pakistan, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, U.S., and Vietnam **Profession:** Artists, cultural professionals, scholars, students

Other: Individuals are the priority (even if some groups can be supported to a limited level)

Destination: United States of America and Asia

Other priorities: A limited number of grants may be awarded to institutions for projects involving international exchanges in the arts between Asia, the United States and amongst Asian countries. Grants for projects are usually very modest in size as the ACC's resources are focused on individual fellowships. The calls for applications open in the fall each year for grants starting in the springtime the following year.

1.2 Fundação Oriente

Description: The Fundação Oriente scholarships programme is one of the essential elements of the Fundação's activities in training. Its main goals are to motivate research in the social sciences and literature related to the Far East; to promote scientific exchanges between Portuguese and Oriental universities and scientific groups; to promote the knowledge of and improvement in knowledge of the languages and cultures of Portugal and the Orient; to stimulate artistic improvement; to encourage training of management staff through scholarships which will allow Oriental students who show great potential but have limited financial means to attend degree courses; to grant access to vocational intermediate training courses for Oriental students with limited financial means.

Type of mobility: Scholarships/postgraduate training courses; "research" grants for scholarships **Sectors:** Painting, photography, cultural heritage, research, architecture, design, art criticism, arts theory

Eligibility criteria

Mongolia, Myanmar, Pakistan, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, Vietnam **Profession:** Artists, cultural professionals, scholars **Destination:** Portugal for Asian nationals **Other priorities:** Short-term scholarships – applications in June and December; research scholarship – applications in January **Grant coverage:** Depends on the length of the scholarship (1-3 months) and travel included

1.3 Arts Network Asia

Description: Arts Network Asia (ANA), set up by an independent group of artists, cultural workers and arts activists from Asia, is an enabling grant body working across borders in multiple disciplines that encourages and supports regional artistic collaboration as well as develops managerial and administrative skills within Asia. Arts Network Asia is motivated by the philosophy of meaningful collaboration, distinguished by mutual respect, initiated in Asia and carried out together with Asian artists and arts communities. It operates in 11 languages. ANA was created in 1999 by Ong Ken Seng (Artistic director of Theatreworks). ANA is funded through special funds from the Rockefeller Foundation and the Ford Foundation.

Type of mobility: Project and production grants Sector: All

Eligibility criteria

Nationality: Bangladesh, Brunei, Cambodia, China, India, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, Laos, Malaysia, Mongolia, Myanmar, Pakistan, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, Vietnam

Profession: Artists, art practitioners, art activists

Destination: Asia

Other priorities: Deadline for applications is once a year. One of the objectives of the new ANA is to explore the potential of local-regional-global complementation, hence the projects related to intergenerations' local interactions, linking memories, local wisdoms and the future sustainabilities of cultures will be given priority.

Grant coverage: Maximum of US\$ 10,000 (travel grants of US\$ 1,000 are also available throughout the year). Applications to be submitted not later than one month before the event.

1.4 SEAMEO-SPAFA-Regional Centre for Archaeology and Fine Arts

Description: SEAMEO SPAFA, Regional Centre for Archaeology and Fine Arts, is part of the Southeast-Asian Ministers of Education Organization (SEAMEO), an international organization dedicated to promoting co-operation in education, science and culture in Southeast Asia. Among other aims, SEAMEO-SPAFA seeks to further professional competence in the fields of archaeology and fine arts through regional programmes and activities, and through sharing of resources and experiences.

The Centre collaborates with governments, institutions of its member-countries and associate member-countries, international agencies and academic communities, as well as non-governmental organizations and private sector bodies to carry out trainings, seminars, conferences, library and documentation services, staff exchanges etc.

Type of mobility: Events participation grants

Sectors: Painting, sculpture, photography, architecture, cultural heritage

Eligibility criteria

Nationality: ASEAN nationals

Profession: Experts, practitioners in the field of archaeology, fine arts, conservation and cultural heritage

Destination: ASEAN countries or associate countries (rarely)

Other priorities: There is no fund as such but regular activities and programmes with possible open calls for applications

Grant coverage: Travel grants and accommodation for some projects.

1.5 SEASREP Foundation

Southeast Asian Studies Exchange Programme

Description: The SEASREP Foundation, funded by the Japan Foundation and the Toyota Foundation, is a non-profit and non-stock organisation that aims to promote Southeast Asian studies in Southeast Asia by Southeast Asians through its projects and four grant programmes: language training; visiting professors; the Luisa Mallari Fellowships for M.A., the Ph.D. research in Southeast Asian Studies (run by the Manila office); and regional collaboration (run by the Tokyo office).

Type of mobility: Scholarships/postgraduate training courses; event participation grants Sector: Research

Eligibility criteria

Age: Below 40 years for the Luisa Mallari Fellowship

Nationality: ASEAN member countries

Profession: For the Luisa Mallari Fellowship for M.A. /Ph.D. research in Southeast Asian Studies: Southeast Asian nationals enrolled in social science or humanities graduate programmes in a Southeast Asian university. For the regional collaboration: any scholar in the humanities or social sciences who is a Southeast Asian national residing in the region, regardless of institutional affiliation. **Destination:** ASEAN Countries

Other: Fellowships aim to foster mutual understanding, and reinforce cross-national cooperation and regional identity of Southeast Asia. Applications are accepted from February to September. The fiscal year runs from 1 April to 31 March. Application forms are available from the Manila Secretariat, the Tokyo Joint Secretariat, the appropriate liaison officers of the eight participating universities, and the Japan Foundation offices in the region.

Grant coverage: N. A. Apart from the above mentioned scholarships, there are regular calls for seminars and workshops for which travel grants and accommodation can be covered.

1.6 Fukuoka Asian Art Museum

Curators-in-Residence Programme

Description: The Fukuoka Asian Art Museum (FAAM) is the only museum in the world that systematically collects and exhibits Asian modern and contemporary art. The works in the collection of the museum are not imitations of Western art or repetitions of traditional works. Instead, they seek to overcome the existing framework of art being made by artists living in 'contemporary' Asia.

FAAM invites Asian artists, researchers and curators for an extended period of time in order to present various interactive programmes. The programme aims at enriching local culture, deepening understanding and interest in Asian art among the people of Fukuoka as well as position FAAM as a major centre for exchanging ideas and aesthetics through art.

Other priorities: The residency includes research on Asian contemporary art, the organisation of an educational programme and the presentation of the research. Call for the selection of one curator (42 days stay).

Grant coverage: Travel, accommodation, allowance, art exchange programme production costs, insurance

The residency includes an exchange programme with Fukuoka people (at least three workshops and one exhibition have to take place). There is one call for applications with two residency periods (maximum of 70 days) per year.

1.7 Festival Tokyo

Emerging Artists Program

Description: Festival Tokyo is an international performing arts festival that sees cutting edge works by artists from Japan and around the world. Since 2011, the Festival has aimed to create a platform for Asian arts, expanding its *Emerging Artists Program* in the Asian mainland.

Type of mobility: Support for the participation of professionals in transnational networks; touring incentives for groups

Sectors: Theatre, dance

Eligibility criteria

Age: Below 40 years old Nationality: Asia; if international, the applicant shall be based in Asia. Profession: Artists/theatre groups Other: Not more than 15 people for the touring

Destination: Japan

Grant coverage: Accommodation, economy return ticket for a maximum of 15 people, performance venue and publicity. Local expenses (transportation and meals etc.) and visas/insurances are the group's responsibility.

1.8 Korea Foundation for Advanced Studies

International Scholar Exchange Fellowship

Asian Film Academy

Description: The Asian Film Academy (AFA) is an education programme where young talented film professionals from Asia meet established and experienced ones. For eight years, 194 young film professionals from 29 countries graduated from AFA and are actively working in the field, with many of their works being invited to prestigious film festivals around the world. AFA will continue its support to these young talents to be become leading filmmakers in Asia with various programmes and support funds.

Asian Project Market

Description: Pusan Promotion Plan (PPP) formally renamed the *Asian Project Market* (APM) in 2011 is a platform where promising directors and producers of Asia are given opportunities to meet with coproducers or financiers. The rebranding of PPP was done when its major supporter the "Busan Metropolitan City" changed its official name from Pusan to Busan. The APM perfectly matches the profile of the PPP, which has established itself as the biggest and the important pre-market in Asia for the last 13 years.

1.11 RimbunDahan

Residencies

Description: RimbunDahan runs a range of artists-in-residence programmes to encourage visual artists, writers and other creative individuals to explore and develop their artistic work. Financed by the architectural practice of Hijjas Kasturi Associates Sdn., RimbunDahan's programmes range from all-inclusive residencies that cover accommodation, allowance, materials, studios and final exhibitions to limited residencies that provide accommodation and studios only. The residency programmes include:

- Malaysia-Australia Visual Artist Residency (duration: year-long, funding: fully funded, outcome: final exhibition)
- Shorter Residencies (duration: 1-3 months, funding: available for Southeast Asian artists' only, outcome: NA)
- Choreographer's Residency (duration: 1-3 months, funding: available for Southeast Asian artists' only, outcome: optional final performance)
- Residencies at Hotel Penaga in Georgetown, Penang (duration: 1-3 months, funding: available for Southeast Asian artists' only, outcome: NA)

Eligibility criteria Nationality: South East Asian countries and Australia Profession: Artists, creators (depends on the residency) Destination: Malaysia Other priorities: Conditions depend on the type of residency. Grant coverage Travel (return airfare), living expenses among other costs.

HOM's core objective is to promote and nurture young artists through its key programmes: the residency programme, the art fund and the art award.

Nationality: Filipino, Indonesian, Malaysian Profession: Artists Destination: Southeast-Asia (Malaysia, Philippines, Indonesia) Other priorities: The residency entails 30 days each in Kuala Lumpur, Jogjakarta and Manila. During this time, artists-in-residence not only produce artworks for exhibitions in each city, but also participate in studio visits, gallery and art institution visits. They are also introduced to significant art collectors and

art communities.

2.1 Centre for Culture and Development (CKU) – Ex DCCD

Arts Fund

Description: The Centre for Culture and Development (CKU) promotes cultural co-operation between Denmark and the developing countries in Africa, Asia, Latin America, and the Middle East. Its work is based on partnerships and collaborations through different programmes including the *Arts Fund*.

In its 'Plan of Action' CKU has prioritised its programmes based on the following principles: Target group orientation (addressing new audience); Multiplication effect, Innovation (priorities on new creativity/development of cultural heritage and traditions relevant to contemporary society); Synergy (collaborations that add to more than the sum of two individual projects); Quality (artistic/aesthetic, pedagogical, developmental); Local partnership and co-ownership. **Type of mobility:** Project and production grants

Sectors: All sectors

Eligibility criteria

Nationality: Bangladesh, Cambodia, Philippines, Myanmar, Laos, Indonesia, India, Pakistan, Vietnam and Mongolia

Profession: Organisations (proposals should come from a Danish person (legal) /group/organisation) **Other priorities:** Applicants must use the Danish application form as only projects with a Danish partner are eligible for support from CKU.

Destination: Denmark, Asia, and other world regions covered by CKU

Grant coverage: Mostly between d.kr 5,000 to 100,000. Occasionally, more funding is available.

RAVE Scholarships

Description: The Institut für Auslandsbeziehungen-IFA (Institute for Foreign Cultural Relations) is an organisation operating worldwide to promote artistic exchange and dialogue between civil societies and to provide information about foreign cultural policy. Through its partnership with the Alexander Rave Foundation, the *Rave Scholarships* contribute to further practical training in realising art exhibitions. Description: The *Artists' Contacts* programme supports working stays and tours of contemporary artists, curators, art educators, art theoreticians, architects and designers from developing and emerging countries to Germany. Subsidies can be assigned for exhibitions, performances, artist-in-residence programmes, workshops, preparatory and research trips, international symposia, conferences and lectures.

Type of mobility: Artists/writers' residencies; event participation grants; scholarships/postgraduate training courses; support for professionals in transnational networks; touring incentives for groups **Sectors:** Visual arts, cultural management, art criticism, cultural heritage

This programme aims to facilitate connections between representatives from the "South" and central/eastern European countries and international performing arts markets. It also aims to contribute to the professional development of companies and artists. There is also a possibility of supporting visual arts-related programmes.

The cash stipend can be used for project expenses, new equipment, film and developing costs, working time for the project, etc. The Open Society Foundations will pay for travel and hotel expenses and provide a per diem to cover meals and incidentals for the workshops.

3.7 National Museum of Contemporary Art, Korea

International Fellowship in Cultural Studies of Contemporary Art

Description: The National Museum of Contemporary Art, Korea since 2005 has developed an international research programme dedicated to museum professionals including curators, art critics, conservators, exhibition designers, and educators. This programme is part of the Cultural Partnership Initiative Project (CPI) run by the Ministry of Culture, Sports and Tourism of Korea. Participants of this programme are mainly art museum curators from all over the world with a regional focus. **Type of mobility:** Scholarships/postgraduate training courses

3.8 European Audiovisual Entrepreneur (EAVE)

Ties That Bind (Asia-Europe Producers)

Description: *Ties That Bind – Asia-Europe Producers Workshop* was organised in 2012 in partnership with Friuli Venezia Giulia Audio-visual Fund, EAVE, Udine Far East Film Festival and Busan International Film Festival/Asian Project Market, and supported by the European Union programme MEDIA Mundus. This is the fourth workshop in the series.

The programme is articulated around two workshops. The first workshop takes place at the Udine Far East Festival and second at the Busan International Film Festival. The workshop brings together 10 film producers from Asian and European countries. Each producer is selected together with a feature film project in development and works with leading industry experts from both continents during the two workshops.

Type of mobility: Events participation grants (for project development); market development grants **Sector:** Cinema

Eligibility criteria

Nationality: Asia (Cambodia, China, Indonesia Japan, Korea, Laos, Malaysia, Mongolia, Myanmar, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand and Vietnam) and Europe

Other priorities: Projects suggested by Asian applicants should have a potential for co-production with Europe, and projects suggested by European applicants should have a potential for co-production with Asia

Grant coverage: The participation at *Ties That Bind* is free of charge. Each participant will be offered accommodation (full board including meals) for the duration of the workshop. In addition, *Ties That Bind* will offer a number of partial scholarships to contribute towards travel costs.

3.9 Ateliers du Cinema Européen (ACE)

Description: In 1993 a seasoned group of independent European producers, led by René Cleitman and David Puttnam, decided to pool together their experience and know-how with the purpose of sharing it with up and coming film producers and supporting the cause of independent cinema. With the support of a large network of industry professionals, they founded the Ateliers du Cinema Européen (ACE), a centre for training and development geared towards helping independent European producers.

ACE is financed (at 50% to 70% according to the years) by the Media Mundus programme of the European Film Commission. It also has a special agreement with the New Zealand Film Commission and with Screen Australia to provide participants with scholarships to cover expenses to attend training and seminars.

3.10 International Film Festival Rotterdam, The Netherlands

Rotterdam Lab

Description: Set up in 2001, the *Rotterdam Lab* is organized by CineMart at the International Film Festival Rotterdam, in close cooperation with various international partner organisations that are involved in the training of young producers, as well as funding bodies and film agencies.

CineMart is dedicated to supporting emerging producers by giving them the opportunities to gain expertise and knowledge. Besides the presentation of projects at its co-production market, CineMart organises a training workshop and networking opportunity for emerging producers that takes place concurrently during the four days of CineMart.

The Rotterdam Lab works closely with partner organisations in several countries. Applications can be submitted through these organisations only.

members of the ensemble must be at least 18 years of age (by June 2014) and a permanent resident of the country in which the ensemble is based. Priority will be given to ensembles that feature individuals who have not previously participated in *Centerstage*.

Destination: United States of America.

Other priorities: The visiting artists should have an interest in engaging with U.S. communities, including youth, through public and in-school performances, workshops, discussions, artist-to-artist exchanges, and social events.
