MAPPING OF FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES FOR INTERNATIONAL CULTURAL EXCHANGE IN ASIA MOBILITY FUNDING GUIDE

This *Mobility Funding Guide* is a concrete output of the mapping of funding opportunities for international exchange in 19 countries in Asia. It was first released on culture360.org in September 2012 by the Asia-Europe Foundation (ASEF) with the cooperation of Arts Network Asia (ANA), Korea Arts Management Service (KAMS), Japan Center, Pacific Basin Arts Communication (PARC), and Tokyo Performing Arts Market (TPAM).

Its main objectives are to make available online the existing information on funding that supports the international mobility of artists and cultural operators in Asia and to provide input to funders on how to fill in the existing funding gaps for international cultural exchange in Asia.

The guide follows the existing model of the *Guide to funding opportunities for the international mobility of artists and culture professionals in Europe*ⁱ, produced by the Foundation Interarts, On the Move and PRACTICS.

In this Asian edition, you can find funding opportunities by country in most artistic and cultural disciplines. The guide lists national resources when available, as well as regional and international sources of funding - be they public or private. Only regular opportunities accessible online are listed. Not included are: funds for which information is only available offline, funds that are not based on open calls, and ad hoc or short-term funding.

For a full overview of the methodology and scope of the research, please refer to the publication's *General Introduction*ⁱⁱ.

This guide is an attempt to gather all the resources in one document and is by no means complete. As we aim to update it on a regular basis through further research and input from the field, your feedback is crucial.

NATIONAL SOURCES OF FUNDING

1. FOREIGN CULTURAL INSTITUTES AND FUNDS

1.1 Charles Wallace Pakistan Trust (CWPT)

Visiting Artists Programme

Description: The Charles Wallace *Visiting Artists Programme* enables arts practitioners from Pakistan to spend time in art residency or for training and familiarization purposes in the United Kingdom. Currently, participants mainly come from the field of visual arts, but other art forms also qualify for support.

Charles Wallace Pakistan Trust (CWPT) manages two schemes:

- The Prince's School of Traditional Arts affiliated to the University of Wales. Under a partnership between the Prince's School, London and the National College of Arts (NCA), Lahore, a Pakistani artist or craftsman is invited to spend a term working at the School in London each year. Fees are waived by the School and living expenses are met by the Charles Wallace Pakistan Trust (CWPT)
- The artist's residency is funded by the Charles Wallace Pakistan Trust (CWPT) and the Rangoonwala Foundation and administered by Gasworks and Green Cardamom, United Kingdom. (Note: Individuals cannot apply separately for funding to these organisations)

Type of mobility: Artists/writers in residencies; scholarships/postgraduate training courses

Sectors: Visual arts, crafts

Eligibility criteria

Age: NA

Nationality: Pakistan

Profession: Artist or craftsman

Other: Apart from the partnerships described above, it is also open to individual arts practitioners from Pakistan to make their own arrangements with a host institution in the UK and apply directly to the Trust's Secretary for support under this programme. Funds are very limited so 'open' applications must be outstanding in quality.

Destination: United Kingdom

Other priorities: This residency focuses on professional development, artistic exchange and the development of artistic process. The support, networks and creative environments that Gasworks and Green Cardamom provide the artist with the means to research and experiment with new work, taking an important step in an international context. During the residency, the artist will have the opportunity to meet the selection panel as well as other arts professionals, and to visit different galleries in London.

Grant coverage: The duration of stay in the United Kingdom can vary from three weeks to three months, and an all-inclusive monthly stipend of £1,250 will be paid by the Trust, as well as a return economy airfare. There is no provision for course or bench fees.

1.2 British Council

Connections through Cultures

Description: The *Connections through Cultures* project aspires to develop curatorial skills and facilitate knowledge exchange between art galleries in the United Kingdom and South Asia. A specific objective of the scheme is to encourage interaction and dialogue between curators from Pakistan and Bangladesh and their British counterparts. This programme seeks to strengthen professional networks, develop skills, and create better understanding between the people of Pakistan, Bangladesh and the United Kingdom.

Type of mobility: "Go and see grants"; event participation grants; participation in transnational networks

Sectors: Visual arts

Eligibility criteria

Age: NA

Nationality: Bangladesh, Pakistan and United Kingdom

Profession: Curators

Other: The initiative aims to introduce and create lasting relationships between curators from three different countries.

Destination: United Kingdom (Bangladesh and Pakistan for nationals from the United Kingdom)

Other priorities: NA

INTERNATIONAL SOURCES OF FUNDING

2. ORGANISATIONS WITH A PARTICULAR FOCUS ON ASIA AND/OR SOUTH-EAST ASIA

2.1 Asian Cultural Council

Description: The Asian Cultural Council (ACC) supports cultural exchange in the fields of visual and performing arts between Asia, the United States and amongst Asian countries. Applications are accepted from individuals and institutions.

The main focus of the ACC grant programme is awarding grants to artists, scholars and arts specialists from Asia for study, research, observation and related activities in the United States of America or in another Asian country.

The ACC considers applications from Asian students pursuing graduate study in universities in the United States. Applications are not accepted for undergraduate programmes and the grant extends only to living expenses and international airfare. Applicants are encouraged to find other sources of funding for their tuition. Students must apply separately to universities for acceptance while applying to the ACC for funds.

Type of mobility: Residencies; scholarships/postgraduate training courses; "go and see" or short-term exploration grants; support for the participation of professionals in transnational networks; "research" grants for scholarships

Sectors: Theatre, dance, music, painting, sculpture, photography, design, arts criticism, arts theory, installation, applied arts, video/new media, architecture, cultural heritage, research, cultural management

Eligibility criteria

Nationality: Bangladesh, Brunei, Cambodia, China, India, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, Laos, Malaysia, Mongolia, Myanmar, Pakistan, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, U.S., and Vietnam

Profession: Artists, cultural professionals, scholars, students

Other: Individuals are the priority (even if some groups can be supported to a limited level)

Destination: United States of America and Asia

Other priorities: A limited number of grants may be awarded to institutions for projects involving international exchanges in the arts between Asia, the United States and amongst Asian countries. Grants for projects are usually very modest in size as the ACC's resources are focused on individual fellowships. The calls for applications open in the fall each year for grants starting in the springtime the following year.

2.2 Fundação Oriente

Description: The Fundação Oriente scholarships programme is one of the essential elements of the Fundação's activities in training. Its main goals are to motivate research in the social sciences and literature related to the Far East; to promote scientific exchanges between Portuguese and Oriental universities and scientific groups; to promote the knowledge of and improvement in knowledge of the languages and cultures of Portugal and the Orient; to stimulate artistic improvement; to encourage training of management staff through scholarships which will allow Oriental students who show great potential but have limited financial means to attend degree courses; to grant access to vocational intermediate training courses for Oriental students with limited financial means.

Type of mobility: Scholarships/postgraduate training courses; "research" grants for scholarships

Sectors: Painting, photography, cultural heritage, research, architecture, design, art criticism, arts theory

Eligibility criteria

Nationality: Bangladesh, Brunei, Cambodia, China, India, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, Laos, Malaysia, Mongolia, Myanmar, Pakistan, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, Vietnam

Profession: Artists, cultural professionals, scholars

Destination: Portugal for Asian nationals

Other priorities: Short-term scholarships – applications in June and December; research scholarship – applications in January

Grant coverage: Depends on the length of the scholarship (1-3 months) and travel included

2.3 Arts Network Asia

Description: Arts Network Asia (ANA), set up by an independent group of artists, cultural workers and arts activists from Asia, is an enabling grant body working across borders in multiple disciplines that encourages and supports regional artistic collaboration as well as develops managerial and administrative skills within Asia. Arts Network Asia is motivated by the philosophy of meaningful collaboration, distinguished by mutual respect, initiated in Asia and carried out together with Asian artists and arts communities. It operates in 11 languages. ANA was created in 1999 by Ong Ken Seng (Artistic director of Theatreworks). ANA is funded through special funds from the Rockefeller Foundation and the Ford Foundation.

Type of mobility: Project and production grants

Sector: All

Eligibility criteria

Nationality: Bangladesh, Brunei, Cambodia, China, India, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, Laos, Malaysia, Mongolia, Myanmar, Pakistan, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, Vietnam

Profession: Artists, art practitioners, art activists

Destination: Asia

Other priorities: Deadline for applications is once a year. One of the objectives of the new ANA is to explore the potential of local-regional-global complementation, hence the projects related to inter-generations' local interactions, linking memories, local wisdoms and the future sustainabilities of cultures will be given priority.

Grant coverage: Maximum of US\$ 10,000 (travel grants of US\$ 1,000 are also available throughout the year). Applications to be submitted not later than one month before the event.

2.4 Fukuoka Asian Art Museum

Curators-in-Residence Programme

Description: The Fukuoka Asian Art Museum (FAAM) is the only museum in the world that systematically collects and exhibits Asian modern and contemporary art. The works in the collection of the museum are not imitations of Western art or repetitions of traditional works. Instead, they seek to overcome the existing framework of art being made by artists living in 'contemporary' Asia.

FAAM invites Asian artists, researchers and curators for an extended period of time in order to present various interactive programmes. The programme aims at enriching local culture, deepening understanding and interest in Asian art among the people of Fukuoka as well as position FAAM as a major centre for exchanging ideas and aesthetics through art.

Type of mobility: Residencies

Sector: Visual arts

Eligibility criteria

Age: NA

Nationality: Bangladesh, Brunei, Cambodia, China, India, Indonesia, Korea, Laos, Malaysia, Maldives, Mongolia, Myanmar, Pakistan, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, Vietnam

Profession: Artists, cultural professionals, scholars

Other: Researchers who possess a degree or experience and long-term prospects in the study of Asian modern and contemporary art. Curators who possess a degree or experience and long-term prospects in planning exhibitions of Asian modern and contemporary art.

Destination: Japan

Other priorities: The residency includes research on Asian contemporary art, the organisation of an educational programme and the presentation of the research. Call for the selection of one curator (42 days stay).

Grant coverage: Travel, accommodation, allowance, art exchange programme production costs, insurance

Other: People who already have a degree or experience in presenting their artwork or activities and have the potential for future growth in their field.

Other priorities: Asian artists are invited to engage in making artworks, workshops and exhibitions. The residency includes an exchange programme with Fukuoka people (at least three workshops and one exhibition have to take place). There is one call for applications with two residency periods (maximum of 70 days) per year.

Grant coverage: Travel, accommodation, allowance, art exchange programme production costs, insurance

2.5 Festival Tokyo

Emerging Artists Program

Description: Festival Tokyo is an international performing arts festival that sees cutting edge works by artists from Japan and around the world. Since 2011, the Festival has aimed to create a platform for Asian arts, expanding its *Emerging Artists Program* in the Asian mainland.

Type of mobility: Support for the participation of professionals in transnational networks; touring incentives for groups

Sectors: Theatre, dance

Eligibility criteria

Age: Below 40 years old

Nationality: Asia; if international, the applicant shall be based in Asia.

Profession: Artists/theatre groups

Other: Not more than 15 people for the touring

Destination: Japan

Grant coverage: Accommodation, economy return ticket for a maximum of 15 people, performance venue and publicity. Local expenses (transportation and meals etc.) and visas/insurances are the group's responsibility.

2.6 Korea Foundation for Advanced Studies

International Scholar Exchange Fellowship

Description: The Korea Foundation for Advanced Studies (KFAS) is a private, non-profit organization that was established in 1974, for the purpose of cultivating outstanding scholars and promoting scholarship and academic advancement in Korea, Asia and around the world.

KFAS supports outstanding undergraduate and graduate students and their advanced study in social sciences, natural sciences, East Asian studies, electrical engineering and computer science. The foundation also supports outstanding foreign scholars and their research activities in Korea, to contribute to the academic development of each nation, society and mankind.

International Scholar Exchange Fellowship is for promising young scholars from the Asian region. They are invited to conduct their research in collaboration with professors and researchers at leading universities and academic institutions in Korea. This programme is designed not only to support individual scholars' research, but also to enhance academic exchange, collaboration and development in the region.

2.7 Korea National University of Arts (K-Arts)

Art Major Asian Scholarship Program

Description: Korea National University of Arts (K-Arts) affiliated to the Ministry of Culture, Sports and Tourism is one of leading arts schools of Korea. The school consists of a music school, a drama school, a film/TV/multimedia school, a dance school, a visual arts school and a Korean traditional arts school. The *Art Major Asian Scholarship Program* (AMA) is a global initiative undertaken by the K-Arts with the goal of educating students and scholars including professionals from the East and South Asian countries to help spread Asian arts around the world.

Type of mobility: Scholarships/postgraduate training courses

Sector: All

Eligibility criteria

2.8 Busan International Film Festival

Asian Film Academy

Description: The *Asian Film Academy* (AFA) is an education programme where young talented film professionals from Asia meet established and experienced ones. For eight years, 194 young film professionals from 29 countries graduated from AFA and are actively working in the field, with many of their works being invited to prestigious film festivals around the world. AFA will continue its support to these young talents to become leading filmmakers in Asia with various programmes and support funds.

Type of mobility: Events participation grants; scholarships/postgraduate training courses

Sector: Cinema

Eligibility criteria

Age: NA

Profession: Experience in directing, cinematography, editing, production design, sound or producing at least for two short films

Busan International Film Festival

Asian Project Market

Description: Pusan Promotion Plan (PPP) formally renamed the *Asian Project Market* (APM) in 2011 is a platform where promising directors and producers of Asia are given opportunities to meet with co-producers or financiers. The rebranding of PPP was done when its major supporter the "Busan Metropolitan City" changed its official name from Pusan to Busan. The APM perfectly matches the profile of the PPP, which has established itself as the biggest and the important pre-market in Asia for the last 13 years.

Type of mobility: Events participation grants; market development grants

Profession: Film director, producer with a feature-length fiction film project in any stage of production

Grant coverage: Selected projects' directors and producers are invited to three days of meetings with film professionals. The project will be included in the category of APM awards.

Arts Fund

In its 'Plan of Action' CKU has prioritised its programmes based on the following principles: Target group orientation (addressing new audience); Multiplication effect, Innovation (priorities on new creativity/development of cultural heritage and traditions relevant to contemporary society); Synergy (collaborations that add to more than the sum of two individual projects); Quality (artistic/aesthetic, pedagogical, developmental); Local partnership and co-ownership.

3.4 HIVOS and Doen Foundation

4.3 Open Society Foundations

Documentary Photography Project: Production Grants to Individuals

Description: The Open Society *Documentary Photography Project* and the *Arts and Culture Programme* created the grant in 2009 to support photographers from the OSF region who contribute to civil society by critically exploring current social problems. The focus of the grant and training programme is to encourage long-form documentary storytelling that explores issues in-depth and over time, rather than spot news photography. The programme promotes personal and professional growth through guided and personalized feedback, project assistance and professional education. The organisation recognizes the lack of affordable, advanced training programmes for photographers in the region and also aims to help local photographers compete on international markets.

Grant coverage: Approximately 10 cash stipends of the amount of US\$3,500 each, plus audio equipment and software purchased by Open Society Foundations will be awarded to photographers to

assist in the production of a discrete body of work on a proposed topic. The cash stipend can be used for project expenses, new equipment, film and developing costs, working time for the project, etc. The Open Society Foundations will pay for travel and hotel expenses and provide a per diem to cover meals and incidentals for the workshops.

All members of the ensemble must be at least 18 years of age (by June 2014) and a permanent resident of the country in which the ensemble is based. Priority will be given to ensembles that feature individuals who have not previously participated in *Centerstage*.

Destination: United States of America.

Other priorities: The visiting artists should have an interest in engaging with U.S. communities, including youth, through public and in-school performances, workshops, discussions, artist-to-artist exchanges, and social events.

Grant coverage: Travel, accommodation, tours etc.

Other: In addition to full-time professional musicians, invitation is also extended to adventurous musicians who double as community organizers, instrument builders, writers, videographers, musicologists, educators, storytellers, dancers, shadow-puppeteers, and more.

Destination: United States of America.

Other priorities: Interested in collaboration and socially engaged music work

Grant coverage: The *OneBeat* programme covers all fellows' travel, transportation, food, and lodging costs.
